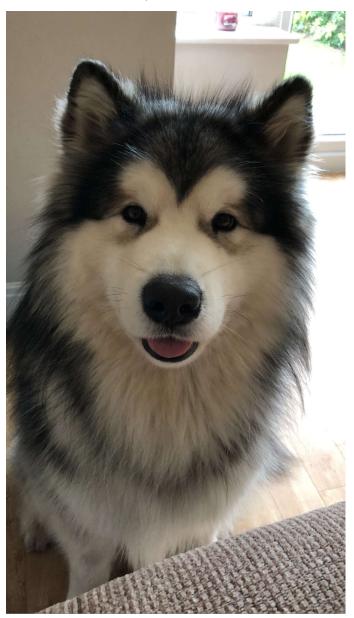

I graduated from Dog's Trust Puppy School in October 2017 and went on to complete my Dog's Trust Adolescent Course in August 2018 (K1). I have been working as a veterinary training assistant with my Mum (Jude Bradbury) for two years and started teaching NTU students in January 2020. I find it ironic that my name is Ares and I am helping Mum who works for ARES, it was clearly meant to be.

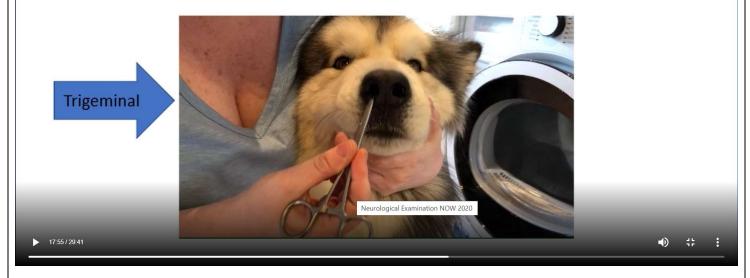
Although I am not a human, I would like to apply to be an honorary Associate Fellow because of all the help I have given NTU students particularly while they are shut away in their houses. I think it would make them happy to see my efforts recognised by NTU and I also hope this makes you smile.

Example 1: A1 - making a new online lecture for Vet Nursing second years

With the help of my Mum I made a brand-new online video lecture of how to do a neurological clinical examination on your pet which I uploaded onto NOW (K2). Dad filmed short videos of Mum and I while we went through all steps, it was fun because I got extra treats (K4). I uploaded the videos onto the computer and put them in a PowerPoint along with some pictures of me and my friends from work at Mum's clinic.

I then recorded the lecture telling the students how to do an examination like my Mum and how to know what is normal and abnormal. For example, when talking about vestibular disease (when a doggy can't balance properly) it reminded me of when my Dad has had too much wine. I was being serious but apparently the students found all my comments very funny and this meant they were engaged in the lecture. Dashboard on NOW says it's one of the most popular lectures of this year which makes me happy because I like helping students, some of them give me snacks (K5).

I also got lots of nice emails telling me how much they enjoyed my lecture and it made online learning fun while they are all stuck inside because of COVID19 (K5, V2). I wish I could see them in person so they could rub my belly (apparently that reduces stress in humans, but I like the attention too) but Mum says that can't happen right now.

Example 2: A2 – using Teams to engage students during COVID19 isolation

I have joined in on live Tutorials delivered on Teams where my students could see my on a camera. We talked about real cases to give them the chance to think about what they would do as Veterinary Nurses so they could link what they have learned in lectures to real-life scenarios (K1, V4). They were able to ask and answer questions using the chat function. They were very talkative which means they were engaged in the tutorial (K5). They also shared pictures of their own pets which was nice, I can make more friends when COVID19 is over.

The students were also very happy to see me and talk to me, they laughed when I wore a Unicorn hat (V1). I can't blame them; I have two coats so I don't need a hat but try telling Mum that. I miss my students but I'm glad they are doing ok and I can't wait for us all to be back on campus.
